2022 STATISTICAL CASE REPORT

Orion Area Youth Assistance provides confidential, short-term, family-centered counseling, casework, and referral services to youth and families who reside within the Lake Orion Community School District. Referrals are made to OAYA for a variety of prevention related reasons from changing family situations, struggles with emotional health and regulation, behavioral concerns, as well as diversion referrals, often first-time misdemeanor offenses, allowing the child to handle the situation without official court proceedings. In 2022, Orion Area Youth Assistance received 50 new referrals and 47 Information and Referral cases (I&R). I&R cases are referrals where an official referral is not opened but families meet with the caseworker for an average of 3 appointments and receive support and resources.

FROM THE CHAIRPERSON



Orion Area Youth Assistance (OAYA) continues to be a vital organization dedicated to the protection and advancement of at-risk youth throughout our Lake Orion community. We are committed to the prevention of juvenile delinquency, child neglect, and abuse through community involvement and family education. As we emerged from the pandemic, our hope was to begin to get back to a sense of normalcy for our youth and families. Unfortunately, we experienced tragedy with the mass killings of students in our neighboring community at Oxford High School and then in Uvalde, Texas, which placed stress on our youth, families, school administration, and the community to adapt to these circumstances. Many families are also struggling with financial hardship as the result of our economy. Now more than ever we are seeing youth exhibiting signs of anxiety, depression and other mental health issues. Through the collaboration of our capable staff and volunteers, OAYA is committed to advocating and offering support to those youth and families through our casework services and programming.

In 2022, we were finally able to get back to in-person programming and open our local office to engage with youth and their families face-to-face. We continue to accommodate meeting "families where they are" by having the option of virtual appointments if necessary. This flexibility of in-person and virtual appointments was a positive result of the pandemic and one that is embraced by our Caseworker, Amber Kish. This year, we were able to provide more camp and skill building scholarships due to an increased availability of in-person offerings, honor our Youth Recognition Award recipients at an in-person ceremony, and host our Annual Family Fun Fest for the first time since 2019. OAYA participated in several community events to expand our name recognition in the community so that families know where to go if they need help.

While we will certainly have challenges in 2023, I am confident that OAYA will continue to deliver quality programming and services to youth and families in the Lake Orion community. I also want to take this opportunity to thank our sponsors, donors, community partners, and others that have let us share in their generosity. On behalf of our dedicated and talented Board, I offer my sincere gratitude. The African proverb "it takes a village to raise a child" means that a community can provide a safe and healthy environment for children to grow and thrive. One way her family is honoring her memory is by supporting other young women in their love and passion of sports with the hope that they can experience all the benefits that participation in athletics can bring. OAYA is administering this scholarship that is sponsored by Olivia's family and friends. The scholarship is available to girls in Lake Orion in grades K-8 who are experiencing economic hardship. The scholarship began in September 2022 and in that

short time, LIV ON scholarships helped 12 girls with \$985 worth of funding. We look forward to continuing this partnership to support young women interested in sports and athletics as Olivia's memory and impact on the world lives on.

CAMP & ENRICHMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Orion Area Youth Assistance believes that providing scholarships for students to attend summer camp and enrichment programs is an essential part of our prevention-based mission. Because there were limited camp and extracurricular opportunities in 2020 and 2021 due to the pandemic, extra funds were available to provide scholarships for 2022. We were excited to offer 46 different camp scholarships worth about \$7400 and 40 different enrichment scholarships worth about \$3300. Our camp scholarships covered a wide variety of activities including summer camps through LOCS Enrichment, Orion Township Parks and Rec, Camp Wonder, Rochester Area Rec Association, and Oakland University. Our Enrichment Scholarships covered many sports, including Pay to Play fees for several families as well as bowling, robotics, cooking, band, GAP clubs, dance, scouts, and Pokémon Club. Our financial supporters make it possible for many students to participate in these activities, giving them opportunities

to learn new skills, make new friends, and step outside their comfort zones.



On a beautiful fall day, over 200 people attended our FREE event at the CERC building. Families enjoyed free pizza, water, popcorn, and ice cream and participated in lots of fun activities including a rock climbing wall, bounce house, interactions with the Team 302 robots, crafts and activities, unicorn bowling, firetrucks, and the smoke house. We have always enjoyed working with LOCS to put on this event and we appreciated the many community partners who helped us provide a wonderful, free evening of food and entertainment for families to enjoy together.







We were pleased to partner again with the Dollar Tree Stores, Operation Homefront, and the Lake Orion Early Childhood Center to offer our Holiday Shopping Mart in December. Shoppers at the Lapeer Road and Baldwin Road Dollar Trees were asked to donate a gift for a military family or a family in need during the month of November. Shoppers donated over 1100 toys! We used the toys to set up a Holiday Market for preschool students from families with financial need. Students came in to the mart with a shopping list to select a gift for each member of their family. Helper "elves" from Orion Oaks Elementary School partnered with the preschoolers to help them select gifts and wrap them before taking them home. We had 72 students "shop" over the course of the day for 315 family members.

HYGIENE CLOSETS
