CAMP IN A BOX



Camp-in-a-Box was created as a way for children to experience summer camp at home during the summer of 2020 since most camp experiences were cancelled or limited due to COVID-19. The box included over 25 hands -on activities (and all the supplies!) for lots of summer fun in the backyard or in the living room. The activities ranged from Active Games to burn energy, Do Together Activities to build family relationships, Craft Activities to get your creativity on and For Others Activities to build community. The target demographic for the boxes was Pre-Kindergarten—5th grade. Cost of the Camp-in-a-Box program was paid for by our Camp Scholarship Funds. Feed-



back was very favorable and it is a program that will most likely continue post-pandemic since we see the ability to reach children that may not have interest or ability to attend a traditional "camp" setting but enjoy the prepared, creative and fun activities.



YOUTH RECOGNITION

We were unable to run our Youth Recognition ceremony in 2020, but in 2021, we were able to recognize the service-minded youth of Lake Orion with a Covid-safe program. Students were nominated by community members as in the past. We worked with ONTV to tape a virtual award ceremony that was broadcast on our Facebook page for families. In addition, we presented yard signs in person to all the students so that neighbors and friends would know how the students were making a difference right here in Lake Orion! Just the Facts Math Club is an after school math program for 3rd grade students at Blanche Sims Elementary School. The program is a collaboration between Orion Area Youth Assistance, the National Mathematics Honor Society at Lake Orion High School and Lake Orion United Methodist Church. Just the Facts targeted 3rd grade students and focused on mastering multiplication facts. The approach was to engage the children in fun math games and introduce creative ways to practice math facts with the help from student mentors and guidance from retired elementary teachers. The program typically runs from January-May and meets one day per week. In 2020, the program served 21 children; however, it was cut short due to COVID-19 and was only able to continue through early March. Feedback from children, parents, and teachers was positive. The children particularly connected with the student mentors from the high school which is a large part of the success of the program. We hope to re-start this program in the 2022-2023 school year based on the schools' Covid protocols.



CAMP & ENRICHMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Summer camp and extracurricular enrichment programs provide invaluable opportunities for students to learn new skills, make friends, experience new activities, practice teamwork, and often step outside of their comfort zones. Covid-19 severely limited access to camps and activities in 2020, but we were still able to provide 11 scholarships for student activities. We used the extra funds from 2020 to provide more generous scholarships in 2021. While we still only had 16 different requests, we were able to cover some more expensive activities including a STEM based service project at one elementary school, a full session of Driver's Training to a student who needed to drive to work to help support his family, and a cutting edge animal based program to one of our case work families.

HOLIDAY MART









CASEWORK SERVICES

Perhaps the biggest pivot we implemented to keep families safe during the pandemic was a switch to virtual casework services. Caseworker Amber Kish continued to meet with clients utilizing the virtual platform of Zoom. In addition, OAYA purchased supplies for porch drop offs for our younger clients and



utilized a variety of online programs, allowing sessions to be as interactive as possible despite the fact that they remained virtual. While certainly not ideal, these sessions allowed families to get the support they needed while keeping our community safe. Additionally, it opened up a new avenue for our services post-pandemic for students where barriers such as transportation and other factors might impact the ability to attend in-person sessions.







BACK TO SCHOOL

In both 2020 and 2021, OAYA was able to obtain school supplies through a very generous donation from the two Dollar Tree stores located in Lake Orion and Orion Township. In 2020, OAYA partnered with bake counters by produce the dist Church (LOUMC) and was able to provide 98 backpacks filled with school supplies which were customized by school and grade for each child and youth participating in the Blessings in a Brown Bag FREE Summer Lunch Program. Backpacks were distributed prior to the Labor Day holiday. In 2021, OAYA was able to distribute the school supplies to families at the CERC building when they came for their Wednesday pick up of food through the LOCS free lunch program. Extra supplies were provided to school counselors and FSCs to supplement student needs throughout the school year.

STATISTICAL CASE REPORT

Orion Area Youth Assistance provides confidential, short -term, family-centered counseling, casework, and referral services to youth and families who reside within the Lake Orion Community School District. Referrals are made to OAYA for a variety of prevention related reasons from changing family situations, struggles with emotional health/regulation, behavioral concerns, as well as diversion referrals, often first-time misdemeanor offenses allowing the child to handle the situation without official court proceedings. In 2020-2021, Orion Area Youth Assistance received 104 new referrals and 51 information and referral cases in which services are provided without the opening of an official case.
