2023 STATISTICAL CASE REPORT

Orion Area Youth Assistance provides confidential, short-term, family-centered counseling, casework, and referral services to youth and families who reside within the Lake Orion Community School District. Referrals are made to OAYA for a variety of prevention related reasons from changing family situations, struggles with emotional health and regulation, behavioral concerns, as well as diversion referrals, often first-time misdemeanor offenses, allowing the child to handle the situation without official court proceedings. In 2023, Orion Area Youth Assistance received 35 new referrals and 54 Information and Referral cases (I&R). I&R cases are referrals where an official referral is not opened but families meet with the caseworker for an average of 3 appointments and receive support and resources.

SCHOLARSHIPS

One important part of Orion Area Youth Assistance's mission is providing scholarships for students to attend camps or participate in extracurricular activities. We are also excited to partner with the Long family to offer the LIV ON scholarships in memory of Olivia Long for elementary and middle school girls interested in sports Our LIV ON scholarships provided 10 sports scholarships worth \$585 to students. With funding through Orion Township and various private donors, we were able to provide 33 "enrichment scholarships" totaling almost \$3,100, helping students participate in sports, robotics, band, scouting and dance. Those same funds allowed us to provide 45 camp scholarships worth just over \$9,300. We helped students attend camps through Lake Orion Community Schools, Orion Township Parks and Rec, Howell Nature Center, Heartfelt Impressions, and Oakland University. We believe that participation in these types of activities helps students learn new skills, make new friends, step outside of the comfort zone and feel like they are part of a community. Families are always immensely grateful for these scholarships that ease some of the financial burden while allowing their children to enjoy the activities that they adore.

OAYA applied for a grant at the end of 2023 from Four County Community Foundation with the goal of expanding Camp SPLAT for 2024 to a second location. YOUTH RECOGNITION

MEET OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Dawn Ames, Chairperson—I have served on the OAYA Board of Directors since June 2017 and have held the position of Chairperson since 2019. My most recent role was as Executive Director of the Michigan Abolitionist



Project (MAP), an organization dedicated to anti-human trafficking education, awareness, and advocacy. Prior to my tenure at MAP, I was the Director of Family Ministry and Community Outreach at the Lake Orion United Methodist Church. I possess extensive experience in program management, particularly in the coordination and development of programs and events for children and youth. Notably, I established the Blessings in a Brown Bag FREE Summer Lunch Program at Lake Orion United Methodist Church, which addresses food insecurity among children during the summer months. In recognition of my contributions, I was named Lake Orion's Citizen of the Year in 2018, received the Youth Impact

Award from the Orion Chamber of Commerce in 2019, and was honored with the Unsung Hero Award by Zonta of Pontiac-North Oakland County in 2019 for my advocacy work on behalf of children in our community. I hold a Bachelor of Science in Psychology from Central Michigan University and have accumulated ten years of experience in Human Resources at General Motors Corporation.

I became engaged in the anti-human trafficking movement in early 2017 and quickly recognized the link between trafficking and various childhood vulnerabilities, including homelessness, poverty, child abuse, juvenile delinquency, and substance abuse. To maximize my impact in the Lake Orion community, I chose to partner with Orion Area Youth Assistance, as I am convinced that their effective casework services and prevention programs are essential in mitigating risk factors and fostering protective factors that enable youth and families to flourish.



Jillian Nolan, Treasurer—Born and raised in Scotland, I have lived in Michigan since 1999 and in Lake Orion since 2005. I live on the border of Lake Orion/Oxford with my husband, Michael (an Irishman). 
HOLIDAY MART




FAMILY FUN FEST

CAMP SPLAT!

(STUDY, PLAY, LEARN AND TALK)



SPLAT (Study, Play, Learn And Talk) began as a small summer school program offered to students in one mobile home community within the Lake Orion Community Schools boundary. SPLAT ran for two months during the hottest part of the summer for several years prior to COVID. Children attending SPLAT received breakfast and lunch every day, participated in academic instruction and camp-like activities and built strong connections with school staff. The goal of SPLAT was to build a strong connection between families, the community and our school while removing barriers for the children and their adult family members. The children participating in SPLAT were neighbors and schoolmates and were eligible for the program based on their address. The families served by SPLAT often struggled to participate in traditional summer camps or summer school due to income, transportation, or logistical concerns. As SPLAT was hosted in the neighborhood within walking distance to the children's home and at no cost to the families, children could more readily participate. The SPLAT program eventually ended to due the lack of funding that was necessary to support this level of intensive programming.

Several years ago, a student who had attended SPLAT shared her positive experience with a school volunteer. This seemingly innocent act would have amazing implications as it led to a very generous financial contribution made to Orion Area Youth Assistance earmarked for SPLAT to return during the summer of 2023. The OAYA Board of Directors made the commitment to bring SPLAT back to the same neighborhood in which it had been previously offered. Lake Orion Community Schools provided technology, access to current curriculum, and other needed school supplies. Parkhurst Mobile Home Community gave access to the community center as a space for the students to participate. Meijer, Aldi, Costco and Neiman's Markets all donated gift cards to provide meals for students. Many local businesses provided donations to create tee-shirts for the students and other local businesses offered discounted food and services for student field trips. Please see our complete list of donors on page 7 of the Annual Report. In the summer of 2023, the return of SPLAT ensured all children from the Parkhurst Community in grades K -5th had a safe, caring learning environment with regular meals provided for the course of the 6-week program. Children participated in weekly field trips within our Lake Orion Community. They also built trusting, lasting relationships with the two licensed teachers and social worker, all of whom are employed by LOCS during the school year, and who invested their time and energy to support these young learners.













SPLAT- Summer 2023, was a great addition to our OAYA youth programming filling a gap for those students that traditionally cannot attend summer academic or camp programming. In the Summer of 2023, SPLAT served 28 elementary-age students who have one or more risk factors as defined by www.youth.gov. ALL students attending SPLAT grew academically as measured by pre/ post assessment data in the area of Reading Fluency. Students received breakfast and lunch daily, participated in six local field trips, and learned and played numerous outdoor games focused on cooperation and teamwork. All students participated daily in small group instruction building skills in social/emotional learning, including problem-solving, being an active listener and growing their capacity to engage in respectful/caring behavior. Students and their families received food weekly from Blessings in a Backpack to supplement meals and snacks at home and most importantly, built trusting connections with the adult SPLAT staff that carried over into the 2023-24 school year. We are hopeful that with generous donations again in 2024, we can actually expand the SPLAT program to include a second location.
